## Roundtable Launch!

The first meeting of the National HPV Vaccination Roundtable took place February 23-24, 2015, in Atlanta. One hundred people attended, representing over 65 organizations from the following areas:

## Who are the Roundtable members and how were they selected?

The National HPV Vaccination Roundtable is a coalition of public, private, and voluntary organizations with expertise relevant to increasing HPV vaccination coverage in the United States as a way to reduce illness and death from HPV-associated cancers, through coordinated leadership, strategic planning, and advocacy.

Members are organizations that designate one representative to serve on the Roundtable. Based on meeting space limitations and budget, 65-70 organizations were invited to participate, and more groups will be included moving forward. Most of the organizations are national, but some are statewide. (A list of the participating organizations is included on the last page.) An 11-member Steering Committee was selected based on their organizations' involvement in HPV vaccination activities or prevention of HPV-associated cancers, their ability to deliver education or vaccination, or their expertise relevant to expanding HPV vaccination.

## Pilot Projects for 2015-16

A key goal of the meeting was to identify and start to define pilot projects that Roundtable members will implement over the coming year. The selection criteria for pilot projects included the following:

- Responsive – addresses one or more of the five priority areas (providers, parents, systems, policies, and health disparities)
- Collaborative – involves cancer prevention and immunization as well as other stakeholders
- Impactful – passes the “so what?” test
- Feasible – can be completed within one year and with available funds/budget
- Novel – qualifies as a project that a large coalition of organizations should undertake and that has not previously been done

### The seven pilot projects will focus on:

- Electronic health records/reminder and recall
- National vaccination campaign
- Provider training
- Reimbursement policies
- School-based education: Survival Guide for Middle School toolkit for parents
- Survivor involvement
- Vaccination neighborhood/pharmacy-located vaccination

The Steering Committee and staff leadership team are discussing how to involve interested individuals who are not Roundtable members. We hope that as the Roundtable matures space and budget will allow for the inclusion of a small number of individual experts to participate.
