



Sage for smudging

DISCLAIMER

This mini greenhouse growing kit and "1,000 Year Old Tobacco" seeds is for educational use only. The Reclaim Sacred Tobacco coalition and the American Nonsmokers' Rights Foundation intent is to help Tribal commercial tobacco and public health advocates gain experience growing traditional tobacco. We understand traditional tobacco plant species vary from Tribal community, and the practice of growing community-specific plants and medicines is an important responsibility. The seeds provided

were sourced from ravensongherbals.com.

INSTRUCTIONS



1). Smudge ALL materials in package (plastic cup, rubber bands, seeds, etc.).



2). Add soil to plastic cup and puncture soil half inch deep.



Insert ALL seeds inside punctured soil area (within cup).



4.) Cover seeds with soil inside cup and spray water lightly.



5). Place plastic wrap over top of cup, use rubberband to secure plastic wrap tightly around cup.



6). Smudge final mini greenhouse with seeds and place inside home in sunny area.

TRIBAL PERSPECTIVES & CASINO PATRON SURVEY RESULTS

SURVEY RESULTS
ON SMOKING.

This survey serves as a baseline to understand gaming patron, employee, and Tribal member preferences toward smoking indoors at casinos. A total of 2,136 responses were collected and analyzed.





EMPLOYEE VOICES

"Casino workers were found to be hurt most by smoking policies at casinos through exposure to secondhand smoke while having pre existing health conditions."





89% of casino workers are exposed to secondhand smoke at work but 44% report having a preexisting health condition that would prevent them from being around secondhand smoke.

86%



of casino-goers prefer a 100% smokefree casinos.

Most casino-goers play more than once a month, have high daily budgets, and also strongly prefer 100% smokefree casino facilities.

90% of patrons believe that safe indoor-breathing spaces are important. This concern is most prononced among those 60 years or older.



Survey found that nearly all demographic groups prefer 100% smokefree casinos.

TRIBAL VOICES

Tribal respondents prefer to play at 100% smokefree casinos and prefer to eat at restaurants inside of 100% smokefree casinos.

NUMBER ONE CHOICE

100% smokefree is the first factor that patrons will consider when visiting a casino, followed by cleanliness and freeplay.

75%

of Tribal respondents said they do not smoke, and 51% of Tribal respondents said they use tobacco for ceremonial purposes.




Overview



The American Nonsmokers' Rights Foundation (ANRF), in partnership with the Black Hills Center for American Indian Health (Black Hills Center), will support the Reclaim Sacred Tobacco (RST) network, to advance stronger smoke-free and other commercial tobacco control (CTC) policies among tribal communities and to restore cultural practices that are integral to tribal public health

Ongoing Reclaim Sacred Tobacco Meeting Support

Year 1 & 2



b. Update flyers and create promotional media to increase subscribership and online participation.

c. Host meetings every two months

d. Invite Tribal communities, leaders, organizations and casinos to share stories with RST members.



Provide Reclaim Sacred Tobacco (RST) members with funding, technical assistance, and resources.

Year 2



- a. Develop proposal requests for: 1. rapid response funding \$50,000 in total and 2. larger direct funding mechanism for \$185,000 in total.
- b. Identify Tribal organizations to manage and allocate funding to Tribal communities initiating smokefree policy campaigns.
- c. Provide in-person ANR Foundation Smokefree Tribal Policy Guide Training to funding recipients and develop a community-specific policy plan with Tribal community.
- d. Site visits to funded communities in order to provide additional training, assist with coalition building, testimony to leadership, etc.
- e. Provide TA: Surveys, GIS mapping, videos, infographics, legal support, etc.

Create Reclaim Sacred Tobacco Advisory Board

Year 1 & 2




- a. Draft the roles and responsibilities of 3-4 advisory board members and outline functionality of the board as it pertains to sustaining Reclaim Sacred Tobacco efforts.
- b. Review funding applications and TA requests, and respond to requests made by Reclaim Sacred Tobacco members.
- c. Meet online quarterly to discuss funded projects, commercial tobacco challenges, board direction, RST achievements, etc.
- d. Board members represent RST and member communities at in person, national events and conferences that are in congruence to efforts in Tribal public health, gaming, education and cultural sovereignty.






Step 2. Community Outreach

Intent:


 Learn how information is shared in Tribal community, and identify a local coalition to lead the smokefree policy change process.

Step 2. Community Outreach Cont.

1. Establish relationships & build trust

Establish trust among coalitions and within Tribal community.

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2. Buy-in from coalition & stakeholders

Coalition initiates smokefree Tribal policy process.



Step 2. Community Outreach Cont.

3. Build & strengthen a policy campaign

Coalition members benefit from meetings and policy change process unfolds.

4. Provide resources & education

Increase buy-in from Tribal community.

Step 2. Community Outreach Cont.

5. Develop community outreach plan

Build trust with Tribal community and achieve policy goals.

6. Mobilize community support

Community engage and take responsibility for policy development.



Step 3. Smokefree Tribal Policy Development

Step 4. Policy Introduction

Intent:

 Engage directly in each step of the smokefree Tribal policy process.
 Mobilize the community and supporting partners to participate in the smokefree Tribal policy process.


